Training Description

Target Audience: (Mental/Behavioral Health Therapists \$ Providers, Educators, Clinicians, Professionals)

AAC includes a variety of methods to support and supplement communication. These methods may include iPads with communication apps, low-tech communication boards or books, or dedicated high-tech devices like eye gaze or switch access. The aim of this presentation is to provide strategies to move the child beyond requesting items and needs into more social communicative functions. In this video, participants will explore different types of AAC and components of social communication. The presenter will discuss opportunities and functional skills throughout the school day that you can do to support social communication and interactions with other staff and students. Strategies will be provided to help educators, staff, or therapists to plan and execute an activity to encourage social skills in their schools. This presentation will be conducted with respect from a neurodiversity lens, inclusion, and considerations for culturallylinguistically diverse populations.

Training Objectives

Participants will be able to:

- Describe different types of Augmentative and Alternative Communication (AAC) and different components of social communication
- Identify functional skills and opportunities in the school day to encourage social interactions with students with AAC.
- Plan and execute an activity to encourage social skills depending on their students' interests.
