### About the Presenter

Tony Vincent started teaching fifth grade in Omaha, Nebraska fifteen years ago. In 2004, Tony became his elementary school's (Willowdale Elementary School) technology specialist. He worked with students in grades kindergarten through five and their teachers to integrate technology. In 2005, he developed Radio WillowWeb; the first podcast from an American elementary school. Tony left regular teaching at Willowdale to become an independent consultant in 2006 and has worked with teachers and students from around the world. Tony co-wrote *Handhelds for Teachers & Administrators*; a book about handheld computers, iPods, and podcasting. He leads Arizona K12 Center's annual Tech Camp, and has served on the teams that organize premiere mobile learning conferences. Tony delivers webinars, presents at educational conferences, and travels to schools to deliver workshops to teachers and students. ### Training Description

iPads are great learning tools and can be particularly helpful for students with Autism Spectrum Disorder. iPads can make a difference in the lives of students who learn differently because iPads offer new avenues for communication and give students the ability to control a piece of his or her environment. **Bring an iPad to this workshop, because it is a hands-on experience.** (Cellular connection for internet capability is recommended.) Participants will use some of the hottest applications for learning, including apps for telling stories, labeling photos, making collages, and quizzing. Many of these apps can be used without the ability to read and can be used independently or with support from an adult. iPads are not miracle workers, but with some thoughtful uses; parents and teachers can empower learners to succeed!

- Use a variety of apps that help students to learn and communicate
- Understand the iPad's accessibility and restriction settings
- Learn how to find and organize useful apps
- Become familiar with online resources for using iPads with students with special needs
