Bringing Applied Behavior Analysis into Your Inclusive Classrooms to Improve Outcomes for Students with Autism Spectrum Disorder

This one-day workshop provides educators with step-by-step procedures for using applied behavior analysis (ABA) to design and implement interventions to target the needs of students with autism spectrum disorder (ASD) in inclusive classrooms. Participants will learn how to conduct meaningful assessments to gather relevant information to assist with setting individualized goals. Sample assessment tools will be provided. Attendees will learn how to use assessment data to set attainable goals for ABA interventions. Procedures will then be shared for designing ABA interventions that will be embedded within the context of everyday instructional and non-instructional classroom activities to address the goals selected. A multitude of behavioral teaching strategies that can be used when designing individualized interventions will be discussed. User-friendly data collection tools will be shared to allow for consistency in monitoring student progress. Tips will be shared for building collaborative relationships among

Fears, Phobias, and Meltdowns: Understanding and Managing Anxiety on the Autism Spectrum

Anxiety is one of the most prevalent and impairing co-occurring conditions in children, teens, and young adults with ASD. Although prevalence rates vary, most studies indicate that approximately one-half of individuals with ASD meet the criteria for at least one anxiety disorder. Fear, worry and anxiety can result in personal distress in children, parents and siblings; increase challenging behavior; restrict activities/opportunities; and negatively impact the quality of life for a child and family.

This workshop presentation will focus on the tools and strategies that can be implemented to reduce anxiety and increase selfregulation and coping skills in children and teens. The objective is for participants to understand the nature, prevalence, and impact of anxiety and to explore the types of modifications, accommodations, and supports that can help alleviate anxiety and improve the educational and social outcomes for children and youth on the autism spectrum.

Learning Objectives:

- Understand the nature of anxiety and the internalizing and externalizing behavior presentations in ASD.
- Identify the types of anxiety disorders commonly seen in children and adolescents with ASD.
- Describe the assessment tools available for use in assessing anxiety across school and home contexts.
- Increase knowledge about the cognitive behavioral therapy (CBT) framework for treating anxiety in ASD, including specific strategies to build coping skills.
- Identify the environmental factors that can trigger and exacerbate anxiety in ASD and describe accommodations and supports to reduce their impact.
