About the Presenter

John Miller, M.S., was born in Montreal, Quebec, in 1968. During his childhood, he worked hard to overcome many academic and social obstacles. He received a master's degree in special education in order to help young people succeed academically and in life. During this period, he was diagnosed with autism which answered many questions. He has taught students with varying degrees of autism spectrum disorder (ASD) for over a decade, has consulted to help create pragmatic and organizational programs for individuals with ASD, and has presented nationally and internationally on a variety topics, including pragmatics, inclusion, and transition. Presently, he sits on the Florida board of the Autism Society and the FAU CARD Constituency Board.
