Chris holds a Graduate Certificate from the University of Massachusetts Lowell in Behavioral Interventions in Autism. Dr. Abildgaard also teaches at several top universities in Connecticut. He was heavily involved as an Adjunct Professor in the Special Education Department at the University of St. Joseph (USJ) as he helped to update and enhance their Master's in Autism and Neurodiversity program. He currently holds an Adjunct Professor position at the University of Hartford in the Psychology Department. His duties at both universities include teaching, curriculum development and supervision.
