Dr. Monica Oganes, an expert in school and clinical psychology with a neuropsychology focus, has over a decade of experience as a bilingual school psychologist and hospital-based neuropsychologist serving multilingual children. She has held leadership roles in state and national organizations, including President of the Florida Association of School Psychologists and Latino Co-Chair for NASP's Multicultural Affairs Committee. Currently in private practice, she provides training on multilingual instruction and assessment to schools, associations, and international organizations, with expertise in trauma, immigration, and forensic psychology. Dr. Oganes has authored works on school neuropsychology, immigrant families, and multilingual education.

Gain practical strategies to distinguish learning disabilities from typical challenges, understand orthography's role, and apply effective MTSS-based instruction. Immigrant student support, legal obligations, and referral best practices will also be covered to ensure equitable education for diverse learners.

Training Objectives

Participants will be able to:

- Distinguish between language development, language acquisition, and literacy and their roles in multilingual learning.
- Analyze differences in orthography between a student's first and second languages to identify common errors versus indicators of learning disabilities.
- Apply an MTSS framework to design and monitor tiered instruction that addresses both literacy and oral language proficiency.
- Recognize the impact of immigrant students' backgrounds on educational progress and tailor instruction accordingly.


